

## *Retirement Resolution*

Rick Prorise is retiring from the Department of Natural Resources December 31, 2008 after completing more than thirty-five years of dedicated service to the Department and the State of Wisconsin.

Following his graduation in 1970 from the University of Wisconsin Law School, Rick was a criminal prosecutor in the United States Marine Corps, serving in North Carolina, Japan, Thailand and Vietnam. Rick joined the Bureau of Legal Services on December 3, 1973. From 1973 – 1978 Rick taught conservation wardens civil and criminal procedures related to the enforcement of the State's fish and game laws. In 1975 Rick drafted statutory language which created the fish and game citation system for wardens, found in sections 23.50 through 23.99 of the Wisconsin Statutes.

From 1978 – 1980 Rick served as the Assistant Administrator of the Division of Enforcement. His responsibilities included oversight of the Department's conservation and environmental enforcement activities. In 1980 Rick returned to the Bureau of Legal Services as a section chief, and in 2004 he was promoted to Director.

Rick's major contributions to the Department include:

*Resolution of complex permit issues.* Rick has litigated numerous complex permit issues at administrative contested case hearings and, by assisting Wisconsin Department of Justice attorneys, on appeal. One example: litigation upholding DNR authority to require the Milwaukee Metropolitan Sewerage District (MMSD) to do facilities planning, an alternative first raised by Rick's cross-examination of MMSD's Director of Operations. Another example: litigation upholding DNR authority to regulate the land disposal of animal waste (see *Maple Leaf Farms v. DNR*, 247 Wis. 2d 96 [Ct. App. 2001]).

*Resolution of significant environmental enforcement actions.* Rick was a key member of negotiating teams that resolved significant environmental violations with impressive settlements. One example: a 2002 settlement of over 900 million dollars to resolve sanitary sewer overflow violations by MMSD. Another example: a 2005 settlement with 29 communities served by MMSD to resolve their contribution to illegal sanitary sewer overflows, the first such enforcement action and settlement in the country.

*Midwest Environmental Enforcement Association.* Rick's leadership role in the Midwest Environmental Enforcement Association (MEEA), which included two terms as MEEA's Chair, has been recognized by a Special Recognition Award for his dedication and commitment to effective environmental enforcement.

Rick's service has been highlighted by his innovative approaches to cleaning up environmental pollution and his creativity in drafting complex administrative rules to protect the environment. Rick received a Special Recognition Award from the Wisconsin Conservation Congress for his dedication to the protection of our natural resources.

WHEREAS, Rick Prorise has been a conscientious and dedicated employee throughout his career and has earned the friendship, respect and gratitude of his co-workers,
